The start of spring means beautiful weather and more fun programs at Livingston Municipal Library. Several St. Patrick's Day-themed activities are planned for the month of March, including March 14's Toddler Time (11:00am). A Family Game Day is planned for March 15 at 10:30am. There will be games and puzzles appropriate for all ages, as well as robots for children to build. Children aged 7 and older are eligible to participate in the robot activity, and 7-to 9-year olds may want to bring a parent or older sibling to assist them. On March 16, professional storyteller Bernadette Nason will present a "Luck of the Irish" program at 10:30am, with comical stories and activities to celebrate St. Patrick's Day. End the week on a high note with a St. Patrick's Day party on March 17 (10:30am). Craft activities will be available and light refreshments will be served.

Additional after-school activities are scheduled to take place in April and May. A party will be held on **April 6** (**4:00pm-5:30pm**) to celebrate **spring**. Children will have the opportunity to create special gifts for **Mother's Day** after school on **May 11** (**4:00pm-5:30pm**). All ages are invited to attend.

Tech Tuesdays @ Livingston Municipal Library will continue during the spring and summer. Upcoming sessions include Windows 10 Basics (March), iPad/iPhone Basics (April), Android Basics (May), and E-Books & E-Reader Basics (June). Thanks to the Texas State Library's Libraries & Literacy grant, our library was able to purchase a new, state-of-the-art laptop to provide digital literacy and job training skills to adults in our area. The first of these training sessions will focus on "Writing Effective Resumes" and will be the Tech Tuesday topic for the month of July. Tech Tuesdays take place on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month from 3:30pm to 4:30pm. Please call to register.

Author Spotlight: Maeve Binchy

Contemporary Fiction



Born on May 28, 1939 in Dalky, County affecting women, as Dublin, Ireland, Maeve Binchy became a writer by accident. While traveling the world as a young woman, she would write lengthy rural and urban life, letters to her parents detailing her adventures. Her parents, impressed by her gift for writing, typed the letters and submitted them to a local newspaper in Ireland.

The oldest of four children, Binchy grew up to be a happy and confident woman as a result of her parents. "I had a mother and a father at home who thought I was wonderful," she said. "They thought all their geese were swans. It was a gift greater than beauty or riches, the feeling that you were as fine as anyone else." Binchy married children's author Gordon Snell in 1977.
